# ABOUT TCHC

TCHC is an association of nonprofit, community-based agencies committed to ensuring children receive the care, support, and guidance needed to reach their full potential. Though not a requirement for membership, many of our agencies are faith-based ministries with many years of service to children and families.

TCHC agencies provide a safe and caring home for our most vulnerable children. Our agencies are trained to care for children with a history of trauma; and are uniquely equipped to care for sibling groups. TCHC agencies are committed to ensuring children are connected to their family and community. Our agencies also emphasize the importance of education and offer supportive services after graduation from high school. Independent living programs and college/vocational school scholarships are provided to help our students in successfully making the transition to adulthood.

TCHC agencies are also working to strengthen families by building on the caregiving capacity of parents, grandparents, and other relative caregivers. Family Care provides safe housing and supportive services to empower single-parent families in becoming self-sufficient. Parent education classes and home visiting programs strengthen parenting skills and reduce the risk of disruptions in the family. TCHC agencies are impacting future generations by equipping families with the skills and abilities to meet the needs of their children today.




671 CHILDREN REPRESENTED THROUGH TCHC AGENCIES


# SAFETY

## GENERAL POPULATION




Children and youth who experience trauma, including abuse or neglect, are at increased risk for long-term emotional, behavioral and physical health challenges. The consequences of abuse, neglect, and exploitation can be mitigated with trauma-informed services and a nurturing, supportive environment. TCHC agencies provide services which enhance protective factors against abuse and neglect such as parental resilience, social connections, concrete support, knowledge of parenting and child development, and social and emotional competence.


## RESIDENTIAL CARE

Percentage of children who passed all their classes on their semester report card.




## GENERAL POPULATION

Percentage of students in Texas Public Schools who approached grade level or above on STAAR Testing.




Children and youth succeed academically are more likely to have higher self-esteem and confidence, lower levels of anxiety and depression, higher income and employment benefits, and are less likely to engage in substance abuse. TCHC agencies provide educational services which focus on the needs of children in care, to help them catch up and flourish academically.

# HIGH RISK BEHAVIORS

## RESIDENTIAL CARE




Percentage of youth who attempted suicide

Percentage of youth who used drugs





Youth who engage in risky behaviors are more likely to experience school, social, legal and physical challenges as well as a disruption of normal growth and development. Substance abuse causes changes in brain development that can have life-long effects. TCHC agencies provide tools and resources to youth to help mitigate the risk of engaging in high risk behaviors as well as support to develop new approaches to avoid such ongoing behaviors.

# HEALTHCARE


## RESIDENTIAL CARE
